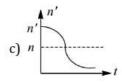

The velocity of sound is inversely proportional to the square root 18 of density, hence sound travel faster in moist air than in the dry air. Therefore, on a rainy day sound travels faster than on a dry day

The correct formula for velocity of sound in a gas is $v = \sqrt{\frac{\gamma p}{\rho}}$

For monoatomic gas, $\gamma = 1.67$;

For diatomic gasy = 1.40.

∴ v is larger in case of monoatomic gas compared to its value in diatomic gas.

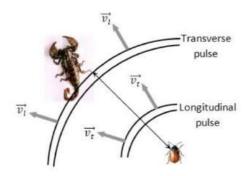

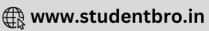

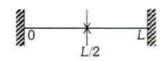
