The Happy Prince

Introduction

This story has been written by Oscar Wilde who is an Irish poet and playwright. In this poem, the author tells us about a Happy Prince and his friend, a swallow bird.

Summary

High above the city, on a tall column stood the statue of the Happy Prince. His statue was gilded with thin leaves of fine gold. He had sapphires for his eyes. He had a ruby in his sword.

One night, a little swallow flew over the city. He alighted between the feet of the Happy Prince to spend the night. He was getting ready to sleep. Just then a large drop of water fell on him. Then another drop of water fell on him. The swallow was curious as to how it was raining even without any clouds and decided to fly to look for another place. Just then, a third drop fell on him and he looked up and saw that those were the tear drops from the eyes of the statue of Happy Prince. It filled the swallow with pity. He asked the statue who was he and why was he crying.

The Happy Prince told the swallow that he lived in a palace while he was alive. There was no sorrow at all and he was always happy. After his death, his statue had been set up on a high pillar. From there, he can see the ugliness and misery of this city and this made even his leaden heart weep with misery.

He told the swallow that he can see that a little boy of a seamstress was sick. He was crying. His poor mother could not give him oranges to eat. He asked the swallow to give his ruby to the poor woman. The swallow was going to Egypt. But he agreed to carry out the command of the Happy Prince. He flew to the house of the poor woman and laid the ruby on the table.

The next day, the swallow came again to bid farewell to the Happy Prince and informs him that he is going to Egypt as it is getting cold here. The Happy Prince urges the swallow to stay back one more day and help him. He says that he sees a writer who was cold and hungry. He had no food and firewood. The Happy Prince asked the swallow to give sapphire from one of his eye to the writer. The swallow obeyed him unwillingly.

The next day, the swallow once again comes to bid the Happy Prince goodbye and once again the Prince implores him to stay back and help him as he has seen a match girl who is crying because her matches has fallen into a gutter. Her father will beat her if she does not bring home some money. So, the Happy Prince wants the swallow to pick out the sapphire from his other eye and give it to the girl. The swallow refuses saying that it will make the Prince blind but the Prince forces him to fulfil his desire. Then

the Happy Prince allows the swallow to fly away to Egypt. But the swallow decides to stay with the blind Prince forever, as he could no longer see. The swallow then keeps company to the Prince and tells him about the stories of what he had seen in strange lands. But the Happy Prince asks her to narrate to him the suffering of the people.

So, the swallow reported about the sufferings of the starving people and at the command of the Happy Prince the swallow took off the golden leaves from the statue and distributed them among the poor. Now the statue was dull and grey. But the people of the city were happy. The frost made the swallow colder and colder and he was about to die. He flew to the Happy Prince who bade to kiss him on the lips. After kissing the swallow fell down dead at the feet of the statue. At that instance the lead heart of the Happy Prince broke into two.

The next morning, the Mayor ordered that the statue should be pulled down because it was neither beautiful nor useful. The statue was put in a furnace. However, the broken lead heart did not melt even in the furnace. It was thrown away on a dust heap where the dead swallow was also lying.

God asked his angels to bring the two most precious things from the city. God praised the angels choice in bringing him the leaden heart of the Happy Prince and the dead swallow. God then says that in the garden of Paradise the little bird would sing forever and the Happy Prince shall praise him.

Message

The story conveys the message that happiness does not come from worldly possessions but from helping others.

Q 3. Where was the swallow going? Why was he going there?


