

# Madam Rides the Bus

## Introduction

This story has been written by Vallikkannan. This is a sensitive story about an eight-year old girl's first bus journey alone into the world outside her village. It also depicts her induction into the mystery of life and death.

## Summary

Valli or Valliammai was a girl of eight years who lived in a village. She had no playmates. So, standing on the doorway of her house, watching what was happening in the street outside, had become her favourite pastime. She was the most fascinated by the bus that travelled between her village and the nearest town. ## Message
