A Question of Trust

Introduction

This story has been written by Victor Canning. It is about how a thief gets tricked by another thief and ends up in a prison.

Summary

Horace Danby made locks. He was successful in his business. He had two helpers. He was good and respectable, but not completely honest. He loved rare, expensive books. So, he robbed a safe every year. He stole enough to last for twelve months and secretly bought the books he loved through an agent.

This year he had decided to rob the safe at Shotover Grange. The members of the house were in London and the two servants who lived in the house had gone to the movies. He entered the house from behind the garden.

He put on a pair of gloves, took the key from the hook outside the kitchen door and opened the door. Sherry, a small dog began to bark. He calmed the dog. Message

Q 1. 'Horace Danby was a good and respectable citizen.' Explain the statement.

- Ans. Horace Danby was a lock maker. His behaviour was extremely good. He was fifty years old. He was unmarried and lived with a housekeeper who worried over his health. He was successful enough at his business to have two helpers. He was considered a respectable citizen. But he was not completely honest, as he broke open a safe every year to fulfil his hobby of buying rare and expensive books.

But she didn't keep her promise and three days later Horace was caught for robbery at Shotover Grange. The lady didn't keep 'the honour among the thieves'. That's why Horace gets very angry when anyone talks about 'honour among thleves'.

Q 10. Did Horace get the jewels from the Grange's safe? If not, why did the police arrest him?

Ans. Horace had gone to steal the jewels from Shotover Grange. There a young lady, who was also a thief, tricked him into believing that she was the lady of the house. She threatened Horace to open the safe for her as she had forgotten the numbers to open the safe. She said she had to wear them to a party that night. Long Answer Type Questions

Q1. 'Though a thief, I am not a man who threatens society', says Horace. What reasons does he give?

Ans. Horace feels that though he is a thief, he is not a man who threatens or harms society in any way. He steals only from those who have a lot of money and he steals for a very good reason. He buys rare

and expensive books that he loves with the robbed money. Also, he steals only occasionally.

I do not agree with Horace's theory at all. There is no justification for stealing, no matter what circumstances one may be in. A thief will always remain an anti-social element and a threat to society. There can be no noble intention for committing a crime like stealing.

Q 2. What made Horace Danby commit the robbery at Shotover Grange? (CBSE 2020)

Ans. Horace Danby made locks for a living. However, he had a hobby to collect expensive and rare books and to pursue this hobby he used to rob a safe every year. This year he has decided to rob Shotover Grange. after reading about it in a magazine. Ans. Horace Danby got very angry when anyone talked about 'honour among thieves' in jail. It is generally believed that thieves respect and maintain ethics among themselves. But the lady thief didn't do so. She made up a false story before Horace. She impressed upon him that she was the landlady. Danby believed her and opened the safe for her and handed her the jewels. The lady escaped with the jewels while Horace was caught by the police and sentenced to jail as his fingerprints were found all over the place. So, he feels that there is no honour among thieves. Thieves trick one another for their personal benefit.

Q 5. We always make a plan to succeed in our target but sometime it fails, although we are not responsible for that. Explain it with reference to Horace Danby.

Ans. We always make a plan to succeed in our target. Without proper planning, no work can be implemented. But sometimes, we do not get result of our labour and our planning also fails due to bad luck. Here, we can cite the example of Horace Danby. He was an expert with locks. He had committed robbery in the past years successfully. This time also he planned very carefully. He even knew the name of the dog. He entered cautiously. But in the meantime, another young lady came there and he could not understand her trick. She made Horace steal the jewels for her. Thus, we find that he could not succeed in his plan that he had formulated quite carefully.

Also, he was a thief by choice and not by compulsion. He also loves reading books. So, due to these reasons, he can't be categorised as a typical thief.

Ans. Yes, it is true that intentions justify actions. But In some cases only Intentions cannot justify actions. It is important that right intentions should be accompanied by justifiable means.
