Summary

Her husband wanted to make her happy, so he gave her four hundred francs to buy a good dress. Matilda bought a pretty dress. But then she said to her husband that she didn't have a jewel to wear with the dress.

On the advice of her husband, she borrowed a necklace from her friend, Madame Forestier, who was her schoolmate at the convent.

The day of the party arrived. Mme Loisel was a great success there. She was the prettiest of all, was elegant and gracious. All the men noticed her. She danced with enthusiasm. She was ecstatic and she won a lot of admiration.

They returned home at about four o'clock in the morning. When she removed the wraps from her shoulders before the glass, she screamed. Her necklace was not around her neck.

They looked for the necklace everywhere but couldn't find it. They even put an advertisement in the newspaper offering a reward to the person who returned it. But there was no result. At last, Loisel decided that they must replace that jewel. They found a chaplet of diamonds in a shop of the Palais Royal which seemed to them exactly like the one they had lost. It was valued at forty-thousand francs. But they could get it for thirty-six thousand. Loisel had eighteen-thousand francs which his father had left him. He borrowed the rest from lenders at a high rate of interest.

Mme Loisel went to Mme Forestier and returned the jewel. Mme Forestier complained about the late return of the necklace and kept the box aside. She did not inspect the necklace.

However, this event completely changed the life of the Loisel's. They sent away the maid. They changed their apartment and rented some rooms in an attic. Mme Forestier did not recognise Matilda but when she introduced herself, she was greatly astonished. Matilda looked like a commoner. She had lost her beauty and charm. Matilda then told her how she and her husband had to work hard to repay the debt that they had taken to replace Mme Forestier's lost necklace. At this, Mme Forestier was taken aback. She told Matilda that the necklace she had lent her was artificial and cost only five hundred francs.
