

The Book that Saved the Earth

Introduction

This play has been written by Claire Boiko. It is set four centuries in future and is a humorous take on Martian invasion of Earth.

Summary

The play opens in the twenty-fifth century at the Museum of Ancient History. The Historian introduces the play by talking about the significance of the books. He credits the books for saving the Earth.

The Historian then turns on the projector. Spotlight comes on Think Tank who is shown as the ruler of Mars and her two moons. He has a huge, egg-shaped head. He wears a long robe decorated with stars and circles. His apprentice, Noodle, is standing beside him at an elaborate switchboard. Think Tank orders Noodle to establish communication with their manned space probe to Earth, as he wants to invade Earth before lunch. The scene closes with Noodle adjusting levers on the switchboard and amidst the noise of electronic buzzes and beeps.

The second scene of the play opens at the Centerville Public Library where three Martians are seen opening and closing catalogue drawers, counting books, opening and closing a book, turning it upside down, shaking and then riffling the pages. These Martians are Captain Omega, Lieutenant Iota and Sergeant Oop. At that moment, Noodle makes voice contact with them and asks them to give them their location. Captain Omega tells them that they have taken shelter in a square place. Lieutenant Iota says that the place contains peculiar items and appears like a storage barn. Sergeant Oop thinks that the books were hats and perhaps they have landed in a haberdashery. They then asks Think Tank opinion regarding that place. Think Tank says that it appears to him that they are at a refreshment stand and that the books are sandwiches. He then orders them to eat it. Sergeant Oop eats a corner of the book and finds it terrible. Noodle hints at these being communication devices. Think Tank wants Omega to listen to the script. Not being able to hear, Noodle advises the book to be opened to be understood. Finally, eye communication is tried but that is also futile. On Noodle's suggestion, chemical vitamins are taken which enable Omega to transcribe the code. Omega is able to transcribe the nursery rhyme on 'Mistress Mary', 'The Cat and the Fiddle' and 'Humpty Dumpty'. The poems made Think Tank come to conclusion that the Earthlings are planning to attack them. Think Tank immediately orders Noodle to prepare a space capsule for his evacuation.



The Historian chuckles in humour. She says that one dusty old book of nursery rhymes saved the Earth from a Martial invasion. She says that now they have friendly relations with the Martians. Noodle is now their ruler. They now know the difference between books and sandwiches and they also know how to read.

Message

This play is lighthearted and comical and gives unusual interpretations of common nursery rhymes. It conveys the message that even normal things appear abnormal to those who are not aware of them.
