But I had always given the first place to the culture of the heart or the building of character, and as I felt confident the moral training could be given to all alike, no matter how different their ages and their upbringing, I decided to live amongst them all twenty-four hours of the day as their father. I regarded character building as the proper foundation for their education and, if the foundation was firmly laid, I was sure that the children could learn all the other things themselves or with the assistance of friends.

Thangavelu



eventually made sure of the gold with an effort of 1.89 m in his final attempt while Grewe and Bhati finished with best efforts of 1.86 m.
