

ALTERNATING CURRENT

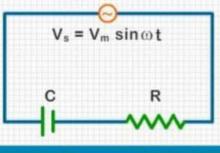
It is the movement of electrical charge through a medium that changes direction periodically

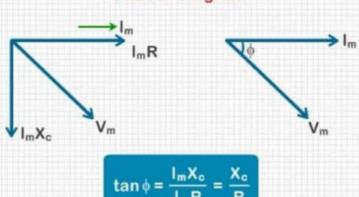
RC SERIES CIRCUIT WITH AN AC SOURCE

Circuit Diagram



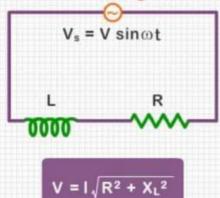

Phasor Diagram

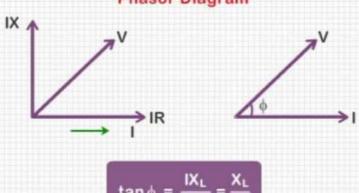


3 LR SERIES CIRCUIT WITH AN AC SOURCE

Circuit Diagram

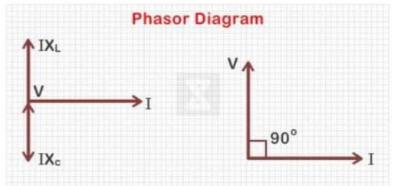


Phasor Diagram



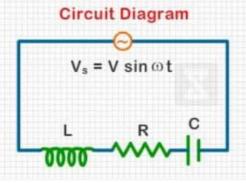
LC SERIES CIRCUIT WITH AN AC SOURCE

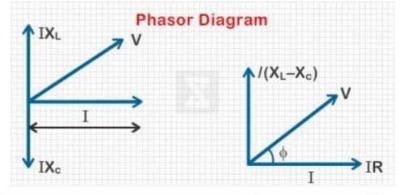
Circuit Diagram Vs = V sin@t 0000



From the phasor diagram $V = I |(X_L - X_c)| = IZ$, $\varphi = 90^\circ$

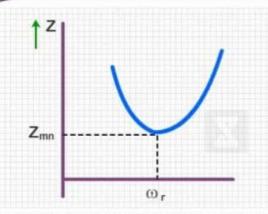
RLC SERIES CIRCUIT WITH AN AC SOURCE

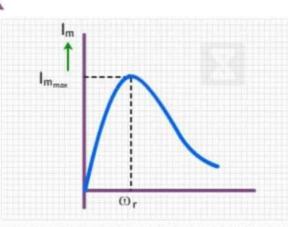




From the phasor diagram $V = \sqrt{(IR)^2 + (IX_L - IX_c)^2}$, $Z = \sqrt{R^2 + (X_L - X_c)^2}$

RESONANCE





Amplitude of current (and therefore Irms also) in an RLC series circuit is maximum for a given value of V_m and R, if the impedance of the circuit is minimum, which will be when $X_L-X_C = 0$. This condition is called resonance.

So at resonance:
$$X_L - X_C = 0 \implies \omega = \frac{1}{\sqrt{LC}}$$
