



He entered the tunnel to drive the leopard out and took an axe for protection only after Suraj warned him that the leopard might harm them.

He is a watchman with a lamp, always present to help and reassure travellers passing through the night, Sunder Singh's presence brings a sense of safety and familiarity to those journeying through the dark and unknown terrain.

Answer: Yes, we can see that Suraj is an adventure-loving boy. He travelled from the city to a village on a bicycle, left it there and walked all the way to explore the jungle and the tunnel. He experienced the train leaving a cloud of smoke, cinders flying in all directions, tree leaves rustling, bats flying and a lizard crawling between the tracks in the tunnel. He also observed the dark and damp tunnel walls, encountered a leopard in the jungle, sippeji tea with the watchman, and even helped drive the leopard out of the tunnel to prevent it from being run over by the train.

When speaking in English, small differences in pronunciation can change the overall meaning of the words. One such difference is in the pronunciation of the consonant 'c'. For example: cat (uses /k/ sound for 'c') and city (uses the /s/ sound for 'c') The poem uses the word 'cinders', which is pronounced with a /s/ sound. The letter 'c' has two sounds. It can be pronounced as a /k/ or /s/ sound.

But which is right depends on the next letters of the words.

- Letter 'c' produces /s/ sound if it is followed by the letters 'e', 'i', or 'y'. For example, city ('c' is followed by 'i'). This /s/ sound is known as the soft 'c' sound.
- Letter 'c' produces /k/ sound if it is followed by the letters 'a', 'o', or 'u' or a consonant at the end of the word. For example, cat ('c' is followed by 'a'). This /k/ sound is known as the hard 'c' sound. That is why 'cinders' is pronounced with a /s/ sound. The letter 'c' is followed by 'i'!
